

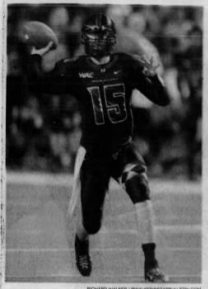

# Colt hits everyone

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Before Colt Brennan was done for the evening, he had one last piece of business to attend to.  
The Heisman Trophy candidate had already thrown touchdowns to three of the four starting receivers. With less than 5 minutes remaining in the first half, Brennan rested onto the field for his final drive.  
Despite never catching a pass, Ryan Grice-Mullins was the only one to miss a cover two, but that he'd get one back.  
"Grice-Mullins said:  
"Brennan did exactly that on his final throw of the game. He looked off to my right receiver for the first and waited for Grice-Mullins to get over the middle. He found him in the middle of the end zone for the 35-yard

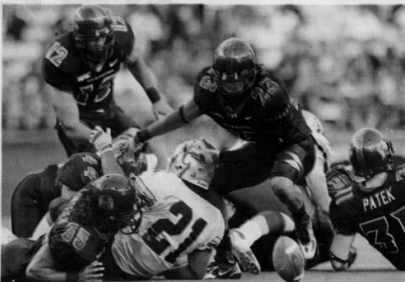
Now his work was done.  
"Everything goes to last out there," Brennan said. "Grice-Mullins is definitely one of those kids who will look back at it after the game. It's good to get everyone involved."  
Grice-Mullins finished with team-high 139 yards, but it wasn't until his ninth reception that he finally found the end zone.  
"Colt's a guy who never overdoes anything," he said. "He sees things so well and was just spreading the ball around."  
Brennan's six touchdowns included two to Devone Bess, one

finished with 34 completions and 416 yards, and again the entire second half dropped in street clothes. Both are school records for a half.  
In one touchdown pass in a half, he set another school record, held by Nick Kobacki. For his career, he is tied with high school teammate Matt Letour for sixth all-time with 99 Touchdown passes. He also surpassed 10,000 passing yards for his career. The NCAA record for most touchdowns passed in a half is seven, held by numerous players.  
"The numbers are just numbers," Brennan said. "We are taking a business-like approach to this season."  
"The teams will get tougher and there is still much to be done, but the numbers will continue to make me proud."  
"It's crazy if you let yourself think about it," Grice-Mullins said.  
Crazy in a record-setting kind of way.

# Kalimoku steps in to lead stingy defense

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With Hawaii thoroughly dominating Northern Colorado in every phase, Fred Kalimoku didn't spend a whole lot of time on the field.  
It was long enough, however, for the Warrior linebacker to help set the tone for a 63-0 non-conquering blowout of the Bears at Aloha Stadium.  
A Hawaii defense starved to face someone other than the Warrior offense was on the field for just 25 plays last night, but contributed to the heady frenzy with two early turnovers.  
And by the time the backups took over as game, Kalimoku had registered a team-high nine tackles, including eight solo and two for losses.  
"Our whole team was ready to attack anybody," Kalimoku said. "We've been working so hard, first team, second team, third team, everybody was beating their fists."  
"We know how hard everybody works on the team and it's good to see everybody get out on the field and play."  
In his stint on the field, the senior lined up to the booth from his outside linebacker spot to stand UNC back at the line of scrimmage, run down a receiver in the flat or chase down quarterback Dominic Broussard for a 5-yard loss in the second quarter.  
"He's a player," UB linebacker coach Cal Lee said. "He

plays with heart, he plays with his soul, you gotta love the way he plays."  
Though UB's base defense employs three linebackers, Kalimoku was considered a fourth starter by defensive coordinator Greg McMeekin.

along with Adam Leonard, Solomon Elinimian and Blaise Soames — entering fall camp.  
With Soames hampered by shoulder and hamstring injuries over the past three weeks and sidelined for last night's game, Kalimoku made

the most of his chance to start as a touted linebacker corps member's soft start to the season.  
Elinimian made two of his five steps behind the line of scrimmage and Leonard handed him a pass on Northern Colo-

rad's first play of the game. Tim Pargisle had seven tackles with the second catch.  
"We always thought (Kalimoku) was an excellent player, he can run, he can hit better than a great athlete," McMeekin said.

# Bears get an education

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It happened fast and it happened often and there wasn't much Northern Colorado could do about it.  
Hawaii scored almost at will in the first half last night at Aloha Stadium against a Bears team that was woefully overmatched.  
The outcome, the Warriors' 63-0 victory, was no surprise. Northern Colorado knew what it was getting into when it boarded the plane to fly across the Pacific.  
But it wasn't a total loss.  
The Bears gained valuable game experience in their season opener that will help down the road. Not every I-AA team gets to play a nationally ranked Division I team, and not everyone gets the chance to visit Hawaii.  
"I told the players to focus on us, on what we do," assistant head coach Scott Downing said. "We couldn't focus on what Hawaii was doing because we can't control what Hawaii does. I was pleased with the effort. We can do some things better, but we continued to play until the final gun."  
The highlights were few and

far between for the Bears. They had two second-half interceptions — by C.J. Steno and Matt Hewitt — against Warrior backup quarterback Tyler Grams.  
The Bears even scored a touchdown, something that looked highly doubtful in the first half. Hewitt's pass on up-38 yard march expired on one-on-one quarterback Mike Valopopovic's 5-yard scoring run.  
Unfortunately for Northern Colorado, Zak Bigelow's extra-point try was blocked by Hawaii's Koretan Jones. That play wasn't the only kicking error by the visitors. Earlier, Bigelow tried up for a 25-yard field-goal attempt, but holder Jason Caprali couldn't control a high snap and after a loss of 20 yards, Hawaii took one.  
The Bears also had three turnovers, including two lost fumbles. That stat could have been much worse since Northern Colorado fumbled five more times without losing it.  
"This (game) is not going to do anything but help us," junior cornerback Mike Hayes said. "The outcome was a little disappointing. We got to test our skills

against two Fred Blitstekoff (classical) candidates (Devone Bess and Jason Rivers) and a Heisman Trophy candidate (Warrior quarterback Colt Brennan) in worth all the hype.

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Northern Colorado's David Woods didn't see any daylight on this carry as the Warriors defense swarmed all over the Bears running back last night.
