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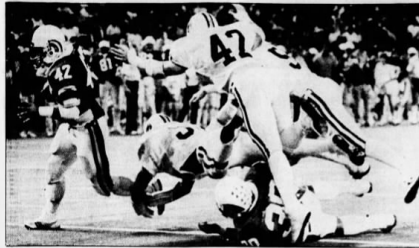

Rainbows make it 6 in a row

Hawaii outscores Wyoming, 31-28; now second in WAC

Richard Spelman kicked a 20-yard field goal with 10:27 remaining and the Rainbow defense turned back the Wyoming offense last night to help the University of Hawaii football team win its sixth consecutive game, 31-28. The victory before an Aloha Stadium crowd of approximately 47,000 (48,804 tickets sold, assured the Rainbows their seventh consecutive 500 or better season. Hawaii is 6-3 with two games remaining.

The Rainbows (4-2) also moved into second place in the Western Athletic Conference behind nine-time conference champion Brigham Young. BYU's 42-9 victory over UTEP, along with the Rainbow victory, clinched the title for the Cougars.

The Bone couldn't stand alone

The Bone is a beast — an angry, snarling package of fury that comes you like the Tannenberg thrust that occurs through Chuck Jones cartoons in a carnivorous rage. He is a potent blend of force and technique, a jackhammer offense that never quits.

If Ray Marcus was a football coach, he'd run The Bone. Going into last night's game against the University of Wyoming, the three stars of Wyoming's Washbone had:

Scored 140 points and amassed 1,700 yards in total offense in the process.

They were fourth in the Western Athletic Conference in total offense, averaging 383 yards per game. Wyoming averaged 227 yards per game, ranking 120 passing and scored 26.6 points per game.

Musyoki, Springs win 10-Ks, but good times had by many

In the beginning, there were 10. At the halfway mark, the lead pack numbered 10. With a mile to go, it was down to five runners. In the end, there were Michael Musyoki and Betty Jo Springs.

Musyoki, 30, of Kenya, pulled away from counterparty Simon Kigen and Southern Blot and South African Ashley Johnson with about 400 meters to go to win the St. Helens Pro Century 10-kilometer final yesterday morning in Waialeale.

Musyoki, the Olympic bronze medalist in 10,000 meters, finished in 28 minutes, 13.8 seconds, breaking the state 10-K record of 26:46 set by Tom Wynn in the 1981 Diet Pepsi race.

Betty Jo Springs, a 25-year-old North Carolina State graduate, outdistanced Middle Hammett of Sweden to win the women's race. Springs, too, runs a state 10-K record. Her time of 32:18.9 eclipsed the women's record of 34:46 by Cindy Dalrymple in

18th place at 30:08.8 and Rachel Porter, 64th overall in 30:18.1. About 1,200 runners started the 6.2-mile race near the Hilton Hawaiian Village.

Pat Porter, America's only female runner through a 4:17 first mile down Ala Moana Boulevard, lowered Aloha Tower.

Musyoki was content to be in the back of the pack. Dave Gordon, winner of the 1982 Honolulu Marathon, and MacDonald hit a somewhat loose second pack about 70 yards behind the leaders.

Jon Sinclair of Colorado moved up with Porter to set the pace through a 4:38 second mile. Paul Cummings, another U.S. Olympian at 10,000 meters, was the first to drop from the pack.

As the leaders reached Aloha Tower and reversed direction on Ala Moana, Porter, Sinclair, Kigen and Bruce Bickford bumped elbows and eight others were in close tow. Over the next half-mile, Mark Norow of Kentucky, the 10-K world-record holder on the road (27:22), Gilbert Ramos of Kenya, Ken Martin of Arizona and Dick LeDoux of Colorado fell back.

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
