
The Honolulu team, which was led by Coach J. H. "Red" McGUIRE, defeated the visiting team by a score of 13-12.

BERLIN, Dec. 3.—(UP)—A dramatic scene unfolded today in the streets of Berlin as Adolf Hitler, Joseph Goebbels, and Hermann Goering, accompanied by other high-ranking officials, stood on the streets to help collect winter relief for the unemployed.

The scene was a stark contrast to the usual Nazi rallies, as the leaders were seen in a more humble and practical role.
