'Bows stand alone at top

Finally scratching a three-year itch, the University of Hawaii closed its way to a 24-13 football victory over Colorado State last night at Aloha Stadium.

A crowd of about one Rainbows put an emphatic end to USC coach Earl Bruce's mastery of Hawaii. That ended last night as the Rainbows improved to 7-1 overall and 5-1 in the Western Athletic Conference. They took over sole possession of first place in the WAC, secured their fourth winning season in Bob Wagner's six years as head coach and most likely, a berth in a postseason bowl.

The Rainbows will meet San Diego State next week at Jack Murphy Stadium for what should be the WAC championship. The Astics (6-2) shared the lead with Utah yesterday, when they lost to Wyoming.

"We're not supposed to look ahead, but, yeah," running back Travis Sims said. "We've done with this week. We're looking ahead... it's a good vision to have."

"We're 7-1," safety Bryan Addison said. "We should be going to some kind of a bowl. But right now, all I see is San Diego State."

Said cornerback Zac Odum: "All of right now, it's up to us all to how far we're going to go. We have to be humble... and kick butt."

Wyoming pulls fast one on San Diego St.

LARAMIE, Wyo. — Wide receiver Ryan Yarborough pulled up on a reverse and threw a 33-yard touchdown pass to Eric Anderson on Wyoming's 17-14 win over San Diego State, 17-14, in a WAC Athletic Conference game yesterday.

"It is a play we have worked on," Wyoming coach Joe Tyler said. "All half-time we talked about it, and said that if we got past midfield we were going to let it go... I thought it was a real momentum changer."

The trickery came late in the third quarter after San Diego State had closed to 10-0 on a 38-yard field goal by Andy Trask.

After a 23-yard pass to Dwight Driver and a three-yard run by Ryan Christensen, Wyoming quarterback Joe Hughes handed off to Christensen, who in turn gave the ball to Yarborough. But instead of continuing

the reverse around the right side of the line, Yarborough pulled up and threw the ball to a wide-open Eric Anderson for the score.

A sport steeped in history and heavy in tradition

K. Let's get this out of the way right off the top: Sumo does not stand for Overweight.

You would not be the first to think of it as survival of the fittest, however. In one of the first recorded encounters between sumo and the West in 1854, U.S. Commodore Matthew Perry and members of his wide-eyed crew variously

described the spectacle and its behemoth performers as "the bulls among the Earth," "huge monsters" and "brute beasts thirsting for one another's blood."



McLaughlin The loss of Washington's 22-game winning streak and almost certainly ended the Huskies' bid for a national championship. No. 2 Miami, which didn't play yesterday, should regain the No. 1 ranking.

Sumo started the season No. 1, but dropped to No. 2 after losing to Arizona, 87-0, on Sept. 26.

"We were determined to prove that the Miami game wasn't a fluke," Arizona fullback Billy Johnson said. "Coach Dick Tomney told us we shouldn't be surprised to beat Washington. We just had to raise our level of play a little."

Washington, which was averaging 22 points per game, could not deny Arizona's dominating defense, the nation's stingiest against the

run. The Huskies' only points came on a 23-yard field goal by Travis Hanson in the third quarter.
