# ON TARGET



**'I wasn't worried at all,' says kicker Enos about hitting the game-winning field goal**

WEST POINT, N.C. — With minutes by the Hutton Theatre, the University of Hawaii yesterday willed its way to a pulsating 31-28 football victory over Army.

With an emotion-laced back story — the game was played on the U.S. Military

Academy's campus on the north anniversary of the 9/11 attacks — it was the Warriors who scripted a storybook finish.

With Army positioning for the go-ahead score late in the fourth quarter, the moment shifted in a New York moment. The Warriors forced a fumble with 24 seconds left, were awarded possession at

ter a lengthy review, then drove 59 yards on two Bryant Moore passes and a penalty to set up Scott Enos' decisive 31-yard field goal with 7 seconds left.

"I think essentially no one was watching us, and they didn't want the Warriors to be it," said UH associate head coach Rich Mann, whose team moved its record at 1-1.

"I wasn't worried at all," said Enos, who in perfect form four field-goal attempts this year. "Right when I hit it, I

know it was going through." Enos had an uneven season in 2009, his first as a Warrior. But he retained the starting job with a solid training camp.

He is the only UH kicker on the roster for this 15-day trip, which concludes with next weekend's game against Colorado.

"You only need one kicker if you have the right kicker," UH head coach Greg McMackin said. "He's the right guy. He does the right things."

It appeared the Warriors,

who entered an surprising 3-point underdog, made all of their right moves in opening to a 14-0 lead in the opening quarter.

Army's double-eagle defense — a 5-2 blocking scheme — was no match for Mann, who was winging it in the Warriors' opposite-field attack. In UH's four-wide offense, if the ball is on, say, the right back-field mark, three receivers will be aligned to the left. The value-

## Wie shoots season's lowest 9-hole score to take lead

ROGERS, Okla. — It's a story line for the LPGA Tour has to be: Michelle Wie, the 29-year-old former prodigy finally playing to her potential, vs. Juli Inkster, the 30-year-old Hall of Famer hoping to become the oldest player to win on the tour.

"It's going to be like 'Beauty and the Beast' out there," Inkster said. "I don't know the pretty meaning or whatever. I just try to get the ball in the hole."

finish today at the Northwest Arkansas Championship. Wie shot a 7-under 64 yesterday — playing her first nine holes in 7 under 28 — to take a three-stroke lead over Inkster (66), Yani Tseng (65) and Na Yeon Choi (65). Tseng, a two-time major winner this year, also will be in the final group.

Wie, trying for her second straight victory after winning the Canadian Women's Open two weeks ago, had the lowest nine-hole score on the LPGA Tour this year. She finished with a two-round score of 10 under.

At one point, she appeared ready to make a run at a 58, but Wie said that wasn't her focus.

"That actually didn't even cross my mind at all," Wie said. "I just focused on the next shot and trying to get myself better opportunities."

We started her round on No. 10 and finished five of her first seven holes. She held out from 89 yards for a birdie on No. 12, and her approach on No. 16, a 255-yard par 5, popped in and out of a bunker before settling on the green. She then made an uphill putt of about 35 feet for an eagle.

"It was a fun round today. I have

to say," Wie said.

She made a tap-in birdie on No. 10 to move to 8 under for the day through 11 holes, but she slowed down a bit after that and will have to back today.

We played the four par 5s in 5 under yesterday, a dramatic improvement from the first round. Inkster nearly made a long eagle putt of her own on No. 18, but a birdie on the edge of the hole.

Several LPGA players have shot 20 this year for nine holes, but Wie's 28 was the first. It brought her 1 under on a par-37 nine at the Gateway Classic.
