### UH's Wallace 'doing well' following brain surgery

University of Hawaii's men's basketball coach Riley Wallace is alert and awake after undergoing brain surgery yesterday in Las Vegas, according to a University Medical Center spokesman.



Wallace, 60, underwent a two-hour operation to remove two substantial hematomas. He is listed in fair condition in intensive care. A hematoma is a swelling filled with blood.

For the next 48 hours, Wallace will have a tube inserted in his head to drain excess fluid.

Wallace was scheduled to travel to Utah yesterday to attend the UH football team's nationally televised game against Brigham Young.

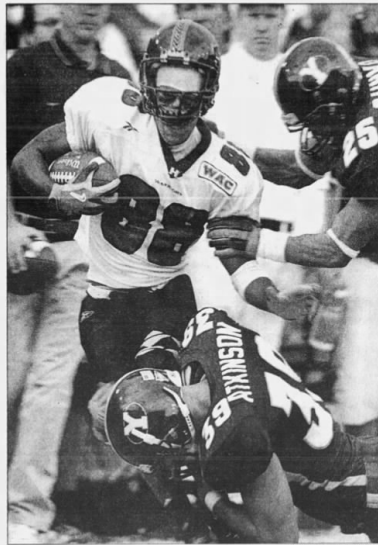

### Rain, Cougars' defense frustrate Warriors' offense

FRUITVILE, Utah — The picture of frustration was University of Hawaii's quarterback Tim Chang slumped in a dazed heap in front of his football locker, his broken right paddle flat but his emotions a mess.

It was UH middle linebacker Chris Brown pacing in the huddle, including running back and defensive end Lamont Correia crumpling in a blood-stained tangle into a

"Everybody played their hearts out," center Lui Fatta said following the Warriors' 35-32 loss to arch-rival Brigham Young yesterday at LaVell Edwards Stadium. "We just came up short."

"We don't make excuses," UH right guard Vince Manuwa said. "Either you're ready to play or you're not. We worked our asses off, but we didn't execute, and we lost."

BYU's Marcus Whalen rushed for 141 yards and two touchdowns, backup quarterback Lance Friedman ran for two more scores, and Reno Mabe scored an outside kick with 26.8 seconds left to exhaust the Warriors' final chance. The Cougars, who are 8-6 in home in this series, averaged a 72-43 loss last season at Aloha Stadium.

"If we get the outside kick, I think we would have won," UH coach June Jones said. "But we didn't."

For the Warriors, there were too many what-if scenarios.

## Early missed opportunities haunt Warriors

**P**ROVO, Utah — Occasionally a three-point deficit at halftime is not something the Brigham Young University football team takes into its LaVell Edwards Stadium locker room like a new-found friend.



At home, in front of GLORS blue-shed, leather-banded faithful, it does not usually occur to its locker room finding consolation in trailing on its own end zone scoreboard.

But this wasn't your run-of-the-mill University of Hawaii's visit to town and an Cougar quarterback Dre Engemann put it. "It was a relief to be down only three points (17-14) at the half. I felt like we could pull it out if it was that close."

That it was that close: that UH hadn't gone to leading by 10 points — or more — was a situation the Warriors would come to rue well into the night after a 35-32 loss.

While this one wasn't over until BYU recovered an onside kick attempt with 26.8 seconds left, one of the mistakes of Idaho for a break-through UH win here after seven consecutive losses started to get away from the Warriors in the first half.
