# It was mostly San Diego State's Faulk

**Marshall Faulk's 200-yard game**

SAN DIEGO — You might have to take his word for this, but his four touchdowns and 300 yards hurt Marshall Faulk almost as much as they did the University of Hawaii football team last night.

"I'm still not 100 percent — yet. I'm still feeling the pain," said Faulk, who is nursing a strained left quadripod. "I felt it every time I carried the ball."

So, too, did the Rainbows as Faulk ran over, around and through them in San Diego State's 52-28 victory.

Faulk hadn't run for a touchdown in his three previous games and hadn't managed a run of longer than 21 yards in the previous four.

"But tonight we were just so fired up and our line was blowing them (Hawaii) off the ball so much that I knew I could make something happen," Faulk said.

He made it happen early and often. He ran for a 69-yard touchdown on the Aztecs' second series and also had scoring runs of 17, two and two yards while carrying 45 times.

"I didn't know I'd get that

many carries," Faulk said. "But I told them (the coaches), I'd be in there for as long as they needed me."

On this night it was to the end, the bitter end for Hawaii as Faulk got his last carry, the tie-breaking touchdown, that put him at 300 yards with 1:25 to play.

At a time when his shot at the Heisman Trophy appeared to be fading, Faulk said, "I want to do it for the Heisman. I was more concerned about this game and winning the WAC. That was all I was thinking about."

Said UH coach Bob Wagner, shaking his head in

mock disbelief: "They certainly have an outstanding quarterback, receivers and offensive line, but... he's special. Not to take anything away from the rest of their football team, but he's very special. We just hoped that on game he wouldn't be quite as special."

"If I were him, I think I'd probably go (pro) after this year."

And Wagner would be more than happy to see the 5-10, 185-pound sophomore turn pro. In two games against the Rainbows, Faulk has rushed for 312 yards and scored nine touchdowns.

The BYU defense held Air Force to 83 yards.

the Rainbow offense, too puffed to do more than just managed seven points and 83 yards, with 21 coming on guard Doug Valenti's run off a fumble-like play.

"You can't score every time you have the ball," said UH offensive coordinator Paul Johnson.

Last night, it was about the only way the Rainbows could have won.

After averaging a meager 14 points per game in their previous six outings (five wins and a loss), the Aztecs put it all together and added a few megajoules for good measure in rolling up 675 total yards.

"You've got to give San Diego State credit for turning it up a notch," Wagner said. "I thought after we scored in the second half to take a 28-24 lead, maybe we had a chance to get it going, but we just couldn't stop them and then we couldn't move the ball much."

After that go-ahead score, the Rainbows were forced to punt on their next six possessions, all but one of them of the one-two-three-and-kick variety.

Where it got away from the Rainbows was midway through the third quarter, when they trailed 31-28.

The Rainbows had pinned the Aztecs at their 25, where they faced first-and-20. But Lowery completed passes for 13 and 19 yards sandwiched around a four-yard run and suddenly the Aztecs were at the Hawaii 36.

Lowery then hit DeAndre Maxwell with a 30-yard touchdown pass for a 38-28 lead and, before you could say "Thurty Car Football Holiday Bowl," the Rainbows were watching their best chance at one disappear.

"We got the lead in the second half, but from that point they took an extra step and took the game to another level," said UH quarterback Michael Carter. "We weren't able to do that."

The "real" Marshall Faulk materialized right before the Rainbows' eyes in the first half, running for two touchdowns and 170 yards on 20 carries to help the Aztecs take a 24-21 lead.

# Aztec is revived on sideline, hospitalized

SAN DIEGO — San Diego State punter Scott Ostwalt lost consciousness on the sideline last night and stopped breathing for two minutes before being resuscitated and taken to a hospital, the school's head athletic trainer said.

Ostwalt, who had complained of back and abdominal pains, was X-rayed for lung damage at San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium before being taken by helicopter to Mercy Hospital, trainer Brian Barry said. Ostwalt remained conscious after trained cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) on the sideline late in the fourth quarter of San Diego State's game with Hawaii, Barry said.

"We still don't know exactly what the problem is," Barry said. X-rays showed no lung damage, he added.

Ostwalt was in stable but guarded condition, Mercy Hospital spokesman Michael Cahill said. Ostwalt underwent a CAT-scan, which turned up no negative findings.

Ostwalt last posted with 9:17 left in the game. The Aztecs didn't have to punt after that, and beat Hawaii, 52-28.
